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

## A Custom Fly Mask for Yebonga the Rhino

On your next visit to Reid Park Zoo you may notice Yebonga, the southern white rhino, is stepping out in style with her custom-made fly mask made by Horseware Ireland.

Yebonga is turning
51 this Spring, and is
among the oldest in her
species survival plan,
with the median life
expectancy for southern
white rhinos being in
the mid 30s. Yebonga's
custom mask allows her
to see her surroundings
while benefiting from its
protective covering.



Being a geriatric rhino, Yebonga's eyes are more sensitive to flies, light and dust, and this added layer helps to provide extra protection.

Yebonga seems to really enjoy her mask, as she waits for her care team to help her get it on before exploring her habitat each morning.

## SKETCH SOME SPOTS

Scientists often use observational sketching to learn more about the animals they study. Learn how to draw a giraffe and study them at your next visit to the Zoo!




1. Start with two circles, like an upside down snowman



2. Add the nostrils by using C shape lines



3. Connect the nose to the middle of the big circle




4. Using oval shapes sketch out the eyes and ears





5. Add smaller ovals inside the shapes you just made to add detals to the the eyes and ears



6. Add the osocones (horns) at the top of the big circle and a neck at the bottom of the head



7. Lastly, add some scribbles for hair and some spectacular spots!



## How to Get Ready for an Elephant Calf

What does it take to prepare for an elephant calf? Semba, our expecting matriarch of the herd, delivered her calf on March 8!

Getting ready was a huge task. Reid Park Zoo's elephants receive regular check ups from our vet staff, but Semba recieved extra special care as we awaited the arrival of her new calf.

Semba was getting voluntary ultrasounds twice a week by our highly skilled veterinary staff to see fetal heartbeat, which was very hard to do in an animal her size! Her bloodwork was checked twice a week to monitor Semba's overall health and hormone levels. Semba's weight was

monitored very closely to to keep her on track as she progressed through this pregnancy.

While Reid Park Zoo's veterinary team was doing that, our elephant keepers were baby proofing the habitat, similar to how people may baby proof their homes before bringing small children into them. This was not a small task, as the Expedition Tanzania Habitat consists of seven acres.

Within the Zoo's health center, preparation took the form of gathering supplies. In an effort to be prepared for any scenario, everything from boxes of gauze to oversized baby bottles were ready to roll, just in case.

Another way the team prepared was by thinking about herd dynamics. How will things change when Penzi is no longer the "baby" of the herd? When Penzi was born, Nandi took to her new role as a big sister with enthusiasm and the elephant care team is confident Penzi will adjust to her new role iust as well.

While all of this was happening, the staff was on birth watch around the clock with the help of skilled volunteers that have a history with the Zoo. Some staff members were watching Semba online from their homes, and some were watching in person at the Zoo!



## Conservation of the Elusive Andean Bear

The giant panda, standing out with its bamboo diet and black and white coat. The polar bear, all white in a white world of Arctic sea ice and snow. The grizzly bear, a keystone of Yellowstone's well-known ecosystem. These are what people often picture when they think of bear conservation. But there is another bear found here in our hemisphere that we at Reid Park Zoo are working to protect: the Andean bear!

Andean bears live in the Andes Mountains, and are the only species of bear found in South America. They are one of the most arboreal bear species, often finding food and building

nests in trees. Andean bears are also sometimes called "spectacled bears" because many of their markings make it look like they are wearing glasses. These markings are unique to each individual bear, kind of like a fingerprint, and are one way to tell apart Joaquin and Oja, Reid Park Zoo's pair of Andean bears. Joaquin, a 21-year-old male, has more tan on his face above and between his eyes, and is also over double the size of Oja, a 9-year-old female.

Andean bears face several conservation threats in the wild, including human-wildlife conflict and habitat loss and fragmentation. To

help combat these threats, Reid Park Zoo has partnered with Andean Bear SAFE (Saving Animals From Extinction) through the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA). Andean Bear SAFE was designed to support Andean bear conservation through connecting zoological facilities and researchers to partners in the field in South America. Because Andean bears live in such remote and mountainous regions, they can be quite difficult to study, and relatively little is known about much of their behavior. Some of Andean Bear SAFE's current goals include mapping and studying habitats,

updating current threats, and determining how to best protect remaining populations and habitats. Reid Park Zoo plays an active role in Andean Bear SAFE with a representative on the education team.

Conservation takes a whole community, and visitors to the Zoo can help protect bear habitat, too! One way to help Andean bears is by purchasing sustainable products. Deforestation for agriculture is a major cause of habitat loss in the Andes. and buying Bird Friendly® certified coffee helps preserve this crucial habitat for Andean bears and many other native animals, both in South America and around the world. Bird Friendly® coffee can be found in an increasing number of places. and is available at the Gift Shop right here at Reid Park 700.

Andean bears can also be affected by climate change; as temperatures rise, available habitat and food decreases. People can help by reducing their carbon footprint through actions such as carpooling, taking public transportation, converting to green energy, and recycling.

By all working together, Reid Park Zoo and its community can help save these magnificent bears and protect wild animals and wild places.



## Zoo Crew: Teen Volunteers Making a Difference

Reid Park Zoo's Zoo Crew teen volunteers partnered with the Coalition for Sonoran Desert Protection for a habitat restoration day at the Oracle Wildlife Bridge. The Oracle Wildlife Bridge is important for Tucson's native wildlife to cross the road safely - but in order to make the bridge desirable for crossing, habitat upkeep is needed. During the trip the team helped plant 40 globe mallow and Parry's penstemon, both of which are important food sources for native wildlife. ## All Aboard the New Reid Park Zoo Railway

For years, riding the train at Reid Park Zoo has been a community tradition - helping many guests create lifelong memories.

Now, the Zoo is excited to announce a new and improved train ride - the Reid Park Zoo Railway - that is ready to track new adventures.

Crafted by Wattman USA, the brightly colored train features a traditional, iconic locomotive and four roomy wagon cars, including a wheelchair-accessible caboose. For a \$4 ticket, riders are transported on

a fun and relaxing journey through

scenic Reid Park.
A whistle, bell and natural steam "smoke stack" add to a realistic train experience sure to stir the imagination.

The train is battery operated to adhere to the Zoo's commitment to environmental sustainability. Riders get on board at the Zoo entry to the right of the main ticket booths. Tickets can be purchased at the cashier windows or with credit card/mobile with the conductor. Proceeds from the train ride support Reid Park Zoo and conservation programs. Come take a ride help save wild animals, too!

The smallest member of the Zoo's giraffe herd is standing 7.5 feet tall and weighing in just over 300 pounds! Moyo, the reticulated giraffe calf born in January, is named in honor of two distinctive heart-shaped spots on his neck. Moyo is the Swahili word for heart.

At two months old, Moyo is starting to show an interest in solid foods and interacting with the giraffe care team. Moyo and his mother Penelope are currently splitting their time bonding behind-scenes at the Zoo and being visible to guests on habitat, so if you don't see them when you reach the giraffe habtiat, be sure to check back later in your visit!


