ACCESSIBILITY AND INCLUSION

Reid Park Zoo is a place for everyone and strives to serve every member of its community regardless of economic status. From Community Access Programs like the Library Act One Culture Pass and discounts for EBT card holders to free school field trips and summertime's \$3 Ticket Tuesdays, the Zoo works actively to be available for low-income families and individuals. In addition to in-person programs, webcams and free virtual programming bring the Zoo online, while free resources for teachers and camp scholarships are also available. To enhance accessibility for people with physical or sensory needs, a free audio tour was added this year for guests with vision challenges and new electric wheelchairs were added to mobility items available for rent in the gift shop.

ANIMAL UPDATES

INTRODUCING THE BLUE DUIKERS

Reid Park Zoo welcomed a pair of blue duikers, tiny antelopes native to Africa. They are the first of their species at the Zoo and arrived as part of a breeding recommendation from their Species Survival Plan.

ANIMAL WELL-BEING, ENHANCED

Accredited by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), Reid Park Zoo meets or exceeds the highest standards of care for every animal at the Zoo. Our dedicated Well-Being Program promotes continually developing and using best practices in animal care. This not only ensures top physical and mental health for the animals, but also that they have an exceptional quality of life at the Zoo.

This year, the Zoo expanded its Animal Well-Being Program further, developing an automatic spreadsheet to collect and evaluate specialized data based on animal outputs (how the animal is actually doing) with caretaker inputs (what the caretakers are providing them with). The spreadsheet allows the animal care team to assess the physical, mental and behavioral wellness of every animal, such as how often and how much they are eating, how active they are, and other measures of physical and mental health. Results are entered and scored in a dashboard, enabling the team to track wellness over time, adjust care plans, and share data with other zoos to benefit species in human care and in the wild.

Yebonga and Fireball Take Steps for Rhino Health

This spring Yebonga and Fireball, the Zoo's rhinoceros, counted their steps as they participated in a nationwide research study to measure rhino physiology, fitness and movement. The rhinos wore a special tracking device on their ankle as they walked around their habitat. The device measured the number of steps the rhinos take daily to monitor their activity levels, behavior and space use. This study helps maintain an environment to best meet their needs here at the Zoo as well informs on the care and well-being of all rhinos.



Stretching for Snacks

A creative new feeder made from fire hose was mounted high on a pole in the African elephant habitat. Stuffed with favorite snacks like bamboo, the feeder encourages the elephants to stretch and develop important muscles, while also providing enrichment and socialization.



CONSERVATION


At Reid Park Zoo, conservation is at the heart of every action. That work starts on an individual level, and extends to have a global impact.

The Zoo is involved with conservation programs around the world and offers financial support to projects that address a wide range of issues that impact animals in the wild. This year, \$120,500 was donated from the Zoo fund to conservation organizations. The Zoo Crew, a group of teen volunteers, donated an additional \$1,000 to conservation.

EDUCATION

Educating guests about conservation, wild animals, and the animals at the Zoo is key to our mission! This year, our education team reached 30,413 people, 74% of whom received Zoo education experiences for free due to grant funding or programs provided at no cost.

MASTER PLAN

A YEAR OF PROGRESS

Reid Park Zoo made incredible progress this year on long-term projects that will be transformative for the Zoo and our conservation efforts for decades to come.

SLOTH HABITAT AND WORLD OF PLAY

As the year came to a close, the end was in sight for two major additions to the Zoo: The Linne's two-toed sloth habitat and the Angel Charity for Children World of Play. These two remarkable spaces will connect guests with one of Earth's most mysterious species and encourage children to explore their world and its animals in new ways. The 2022/2023 fiscal year was one of careful construction and diligent work to build these important projects.

PATHWAY TO ASIA

Pathway to Asia has found a new home and will soon begin construction in the Zoo's former parking lot. The new location and plan for Pathway to Asia uses no existing green space in the park, only current asphalt, and will convert 45% of the space to green space within the Zoo. This also includes planting of over 300 trees between the parking lot and Pathway to Asia. This fiscal year ended with construction drawings finalized, permits filed, and lots of excitement for this expansion, which is estimated to take 24 months to construct.

NEW PARKING LOT


Paving the way for the Pathway to Asia expansion, a new parking lot for the Zoo, the Edith Ball Adaptive Recreation Center (ARC), and Reid Park amenities was constructed just North of the Zoo's previous parking lot. The spacious new lot has 433 total spaces, 90 more spaces than the lot it is replacing, in addition to 54 accessible spaces and ample bike and motorcycle parking. The lot covers existing hardscape and will add green features, including 100 new trees.


A YEAR IN REVIEW: BY THE NUMBERS
